B. Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes

1. Course Description

Introduction to Literature is basically designed to aid students with the goal of familiarizing or versed in various literary genres - Poetry, Drama, Novel and Short Story as well as to some critical reading methods. It also aims to enhance students' appreciation and understanding of major types of literature and equip them with the ability to develop critical approaches to thinking, reading and writing about literary works. The course will develop their abilities in analyzing literary works at the basic level. It will also familiarize them with a wider realm of literary terms for a better understanding of literary forms and genres. While reading a range of books belonging to these genres, the students will explore the basic concepts of literary techniques, narrative, poetic and dramatic structures and innovations, and begin to engage with the more advanced cognitive aspects of literature.

2. Course Main Objective

The main purpose of this course is to give the student the knowledge of how to: Read beyond the surface level of the texts through enhanced reading skills and impart reading habit to them, Develop insight as to how literature gives them a window into the experiences of others

and wider appreciation for the human conditions as well., provide some introductory backgrounds about literary forms, familiarize students with the norm of how literature can be studied, differentiate between the literary genres and forms/types/structures, understand different literary concepts and critical viewpoints and to develop their background knowledge on authors, their works and the critics on them.
