1. Course Description

This is a three hours credit course offered to students in their fourth year. The aim of the course is to introduce students to sociolinguistics and its different aspects. Its specific objectives, in accordance with the stated purpose are to familiarize the students with the relationship between language and society. The course also focuses on other aspects such as basic knowledge of language choice in multilingual societies, language maintenance and shift, linguistic varieties in multilingual nations, national language and language planning, regional and social dialects, gender and age, style, context and gender, speech functions, politeness and cross-cultural communication.

2. Course Main Objective

The objective of the course is to enable students to:

- demonstrate adequate understanding of the nature of sociolinguistics,
- explain the different aspects of sociolinguistics,
- use the knowledge in real-life-like situations,
- analyse critically the cultural differences and variation in language,
- express how people can use appropriate language in changing social contexts.
- recognize the difficulties and problems of minorities languages,
- describe the importance of all languages, all cultures and all humanity,
- categorize the different types of dialects and accents,
- defend the case of their language and cultural inheritance.
